Description

Security Problems

Presents an analysis of the major problems of security in situations involving college campuses, hospitals, aircraft, industrial plants, industrial piracy, public utilities, and municipal and state buildings; emphasizes current security problems and existing methods of dealing with them efficiently.

Prerequisites: ENGL 052 and RDNG 052 or ESOL 052

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- identify trends in the security profession that impact its public image
- recall issues involving the collection and maintenance of secure information
- describe policies related to the contribution of corporate profits and asset protection
- explain the role of private security in national and international terrorism
- assess the role that women play in the implementation and management of private security
- analyze specific areas of concern that are presented in class which impact private security
- discuss the impact of technology in communication and surveillance
