Description

Human Sexuality

Examines human sexuality from biological, social, emotional, spiritual, cultural and historical viewpoints; covers topics such as gender formation, reproductive technology, STD's, sexual expression and ways to build successful relationships will be presented.

Corequisite: RDNG 052

Overall Course Objectives

Upon successfully completing Human Sexuality students will be able to:

1. identify factors that influence human sexuality (i.e.: biological, social, emotional, spiritual, cultural and historical and assess the affect each has on their own lives.
2. evaluate methods of sexual research.
3. describe the structure and function of sexual anatomy.
4. explain theories of gender identity.
5. describe relationship development, factors that influence relationships, and relationship models.
6. compare and contrast American sexual attitudes and practices throughout the lifespan with other times and cultures.
7. assess current reproductive technology and birth control techniques in terms of cost, effectiveness and values.
8. identify sexual problems, current sexual therapy and sexual enhancement techniques.
9. apply current information concerning sexual health issues.
10. explain current information concerning conception, pregnancy, birthing and parenting.
