1. Statement of Use

On April 10, 2020, the Community College of Baltimore County (CCBC) was awarded \$4.6 million dollars through the CARES ACT Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund. CCBC used these funds to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

On December 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 was signed into law. Under this act, CCBC was awarded another \$4.6 million dollars, which CCBC used to make direct payments to students who are enrolled in spring 2021 semester, focusing on students with exceptional need.

On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan was signed into law. Under this act, CCBC was awarded an additional \$19 million dollars, which CCBC plans to use to award up to a maximum of 7 credits/billable hours of in-county tuition and fee for returning CCBC students who attended in Spring 2020, Summer 2020, or Fall 2020, and are financial aid suspended due to SAP regulations with a continued hardship due to COVID.

2. Award Amount

CCBC received \$4,674,935 for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under the original CARES Act which was disbursed during FY20 and FY21. CCBC received another \$4,674,935 under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, and \$19,007,265 under the American Rescue Plan.

- 3. Total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed under the CRSSA Act and American Rescue Plan during the period July 1 2021, through September 30, 2021. CCBC disbursed \$2,470,532.50 during the quarter. \$1,384,932.50 was disbursed under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act. \$1,085,600 was disbursed under the American Rescue Plan.

 Students are no longer required to have a FAFSA on file to be considered eligible for HEERF funding and funding is now available to other populations such as international, DACA, and continuing education students. Therefore, any registered student could have potentially been affected by COVID. The number of registered students for fall, 2021 is estimated at 16,432.

During the quarter, the College was able to provide funding to 1,757 students. 968 students were aided under CRRSAA funding, while 789 students received awards under the American Rescue Plan.

Any student who had an outstanding balance with the College was given the option of having their award applied to their outstanding balance.

"Come Back" students who were aid suspended were also required to submit an application to assist in prioritizing students with highest need based on student self-selecting a COVID-related hardship.

1. Statement of Use

On April 10, 2020, the Community College of Baltimore County (CCBC) was awarded \$4.6 million dollars through the CARES ACT Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund. CCBC signed and returned the Certification and Agreement to the U.S. Department of Education on April 10, 2020. CCBC intends to use these funds received to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

2. Award Amount

CCBC received \$4,674,935 for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

3. Total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed to students under Section 18004(a) (1) of the CARES Act as of the date of submission.

CCBC has distributed \$2,166,850 to eligible students for expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to the coronavirus.

We estimate 9,303 CCBC students are potentially eligible to participate in the program. 5,846 students are eligible based on a verified FAFSA on file, enrollment in a Title IV eligible program, and compliance with other requirements set forth by the Department of Education. An additional 3,457 students have been identified as potentially eligible to complete a FAFSA and would need to satisfy other funding requirements and complete an application attesting to Title IV eligibility.

Six thousand nine hundred and sixty-nine (6,969) students have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant.

- will notify your college if you default on a federal student loan;
- will not receive a Federal Pell Grant from more than one college for the same period of time.

Students are encouraged to receive their disbursement through direct deposit which will allow for rapid disbursement. Checks will be mailed to students who are not able to receive their grant through direct deposit.

1. Statement of Use

On April 10, 2020, the Community College of Baltimore County (CCBC) was awarded \$4.6 million dollars through the CARES ACT Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund. CCBC signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement on April 10^{th.} CCBC intends to use these funds received to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

2. Award Amount

CCBC received \$4,674,935 for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

3. Total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed to students under Section 18004(a) (1) of the CARES Act as of the date of submission.

CCBC is in the process of finalizing its plan for distribution and has not yet distributed any funds to students. The College expects to begin distributing emergency grants by May 20, 2020.

4. The estimated total number of students at the institution eligible to participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act.

We estimate 9,303 CCBC students are potentially eligible to participate in the program. 5,846 students are eligible based on a verified FAFSA on file, enrollment in a Title IV eligible program, and compliance with other requirements set forth by the Department of Education. An additional 3,457 students have been identified as potentially eligible to complete a FAFSA and would need to satisfy other funding requirements.

5. The total number of students who have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under Section 18004(a) (1) of the CARES Act.

As of May 10, 2020 CCBC has not awarded any grants to students. The distribution process is being finalized and it is anticipated Emergency Financial Aid Grants will begin to be awarded and distributed by May 20, 2020.

In order to provide maximum support based on the funds available, the size of the award will be determined by the number of credits each student is taking:

Full-time students: 12 or more billable hours/credits: \$500 Part-time students: 9 to 11 billable hours/credits: \$300 Part-time students: 1 to 8 billable hours/credits: \$150

Funds will be automatically disbursed to student who have a verified FAFSA on file, are enrolled in a Title IV eligible program of study, and satisfy all other eligibility requirements of the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund.

For students who do not have a verified FAFSA on file, CCBC is developing a simple online application on which students will identify how grant funds will assist them as a result of Covid-19 impact. We are finalizing the process for confirming the eligibility of these applicants.

Due to the evolving and unpredictable nature of the Covid-19 crisis consideration is also being given to reserving a portion of the funds to assist students with emergency needs as we transition into the next academic year. The final distribution process will be included in the next progress report.

Students are encouraged to receive their disbursement through direct deposit which will allow for rapid disbursement. Checks will be mailed to students who are not able to receive their grant through direct deposit.
