Understanding and Empowering At-Risk Youth 3 Credits

Description

HUSC 106 – Understanding and Empowering At-Risk Youth introduces the principles and skills necessary to work with vulnerable children and youth due to a variety of factors; focuses on proficiencies needed to work with individuals in foster care or at-risk for out-of-home placement.

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. recall the major historical developments within child welfare;
- 2. apply principles of cultural competence with youth;
- 3. summarize the continuum of care in out-of-home placement;
- 4. describe the Adverse Childhood Experiences study;
- 5. appropriately communicate with children and adolescents;
- 6. recognize typical milestones of child and adolescent development;
- 7. predict the basic connections between parental attachment and child development;
- 8. describe child and adolescent maltreatment and interventions;
- 9. recall the signs and symptoms of the common developmental, mood, anxiety, and behavioral disorders in youth;
- 10. identify suicidal symptoms in a child or adolescent, and describe an intervention plan;
- 11. outline the common signs of adolescent substance use;
- 12. recognize drugs' effects on the developing adolescent brain;
- 13. label different learning styles, abilities, and disabilities;
- 14. discuss aspects of the educational partnerships with schools;
- 15. recall the different aspects of trust-building, boundary setting, and group dynamics;
- 16. practice writing objectively in field-specific documentation;
- 17. explore community resources for this population; and
- 18. describe a trauma-informed safety plan and its components.
