Description

Advanced Topics in Philosophy

Studies special topics in an advanced seminar format; topics vary each semester and include History of Philosophy, Art and Society, Chinese Philosophy, Existentialism, and the Nature of Freedom.

Prerequisite: (RDNG 052 or LVR 2); (ENGL 052 or LVE 2); (MATH 081 or LVM 1); PHIL 101 or consent of instructor

Overall Course Objectives

Upon successfully completing the course students will be able to:

1. discuss an advanced topic in philosophy;
2. identify the relevance of an advanced topic in philosophy to everyday life;
3. explain (orally and in writing) the major ideas and arguments involved in an advanced topic of philosophy;
4. perform research (including use of the Internet) in an advanced topic in philosophy;
5. assess critically and logically the merits of various arguments involved in an advanced topic in philosophy;
6. develop their own critically examined and defended position on an advanced topic in philosophy.

Major Topics

Topics vary from semester to semester.

Course Requirements

Grading/exams: Grading procedures will be determined by the individual faculty member but will include the following:

1. Mid-term and Final Exams (including essay questions)

2. Oral presentation in class (lead the class in a seminar discussion)
3. Critical-Reflection essay
4. Collaborative learning exercises
5. Research Term Paper

Writing: The individual faculty member will determine specific writing assignments.

Individual faculty members may include additional course objectives, major topics, and other course requirements to the minimum expectations stated in the Common Course Outline.
