

Academic Program Articulation Agreement Between
Community College of Baltimore County and
The University of Baltimore Regarding Transfer from
Associate of Arts in Humanities and Social Sciences
Area of Concentration Political Science to
Bachelor of Arts Degree in Policy, Politics and International Affairs.

This Academic Program Articulation Agreement (“Agreement”) is entered into by and between Community College of Baltimore County (the “Sending Institution”) and the University of Baltimore (the “Receiving Institution”) (collectively, the “Institutions”) to facilitate the transfer of academic credits from Associate of Arts in Humanities and Social Sciences Area of Concentration Political Science for the completion of Bachelor of Arts in Policy, Politics and International Affairs.

A. Qualifying Students

This Agreement pertains to the transfer of “Qualifying Students”, *i.e.*, those students who:

1. Have successfully completed the program at the Sending Institution;
2. Are enrolled in the Sending Institution, in good standing; and
3. Are accepted for admission to the Receiving Institution

B. Responsibilities of the Institutions

The Institutions agree to implement the transfer of Qualifying Students in accordance with applicable law and the following requirements and protocols:

1. A Qualifying Student may transfer into from the Transferring Institution into the Receiving Institution for the completion of the Program.
2. Courses that the Receiving School will accept credits for towards completion of the Program include:

* Course will transfer as a major requirement only if a grade of C or better is earned, otherwise, the course will transfer as an elective.

Courses that are defined as general education by one institution shall transfer as general education even if the receiving institution does not have that specific course or has not designated that course as general education (MHEC Student Transfer Policy)

Students can transfer in a maximum of 63 credits.

Remaining Courses

Students will take the following courses at the University of Baltimore to meet their graduation requirements. Students who transfer before completing the Associate of Arts in Humanities and Social Sciences Area of Concentration Political Science may have additional program and graduation requirements to take and fewer free electives.

Major Requirements

All transfer students will be required to take a minimum of 60 credits of coursework at University of Baltimore. A minimum total of 120 credits are required for the degree.

Completion of the Bachelor of Arts in Policy, Politics and International Affairs requires students to successfully complete the following course work:

3. Additional Provisions

- Courses that fulfill program requirements are only eligible to apply for the major at UB if students have earned a grade of “C” or better. Courses used to fulfill only general education requirements are eligible for transfer if students have earned a grade of “D” or better, with the exception of ENGL 101, which requires a “C- “or better.
- Students intending to transfer should complete the admission application for 4 - Year following the third semester of their Associate Degree program.
